Greenville GOP convention news

The Greenville County Republican Party conducted its election convention April 21.

Almost 600 Republican activists descended upon the Carolina First Expo Center to conduct political business and to listen to Republican leaders comment on the political scene. In addition, the convention was honored to have six Presidential candidates in attendance to greet our delegates and to explain their qualifications for the Presidency.

Two military personnel, one Army and one Marine, who returned from the Middle East conflict, led the convention in the Pledge of Allegiance, and Stan Eby led a stirring singing of our National Anthem.

Mayor Knox White gave a hearty Greenville welcome to convention attendees to start the festivities. In addition, we were privileged to have Sen. Lindsey Graham, Sen. Jim DeMint, Congressman Bob Inglis and Republican State Party Chairman Katon Dawson present relevant remarks about the state of American and South Carolina politics.

The convention was highlighted by the presence of six 2008 Presidential candidates—Sam Brownback, John Cox, Mike Huckabee, Duncan Hunter, Rudy Giuliani and Mitt

Four GCRWC members attend NFRW spring board meeting

South Carolina had one of the largest contingents at the National Federation of Republican Women meeting in Washington March 28 to 31. The 23 representatives from South Carolina were the third largest group behind Texas and California.

GCRWC members who attended the meeting are as follows: Betty Poe, Geri Warren, Mary Carolyn Garton and Joanne Meadows

The Sea Island Republican Women's Club sent eight members to D.C., which was the largest group from South Carolina.

Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich addressed the Saturday luncheon, March 31. He gave the women a great send-off. He fired up the group to go home and work to protect the Presidency for the GOP. His comments on illegal immigration and English as the only language were interrupted by lots of applause.

During the business session the need to raise NFRW dues was discussed and approved. In addition, a nominating committee was elected. The site of the 2011 convention was also selected.

SCFRW tours West Wing

The tour ended with photos in the White House Rose Garden outside the Oval Office and at the guest entrance to the West Wing.

Legislative Day on the Hill

NFRW Legislative Day began early. Twenty-three SCFRW members boarded the four chartered buses at 7 a.m. on Thursday, March 29. Breakfast was at the Capitol Hill Club. The group heard many lawmakers including the following: Rep. Joe Wilson, South Carolina; Rep. Duncan Hunter, California; Sen. Trent Lott, Mississippi; and Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, Texas.

The featured speaker was Doro Bush Koch, daughter of George H. W. Bush. She read excerpts from her new book, *My Father, My President*. Her report on the compilation of the material for the book was quite amusing. She even told how she lined the walls of her dining room with chronological materials.

After the breakfast, the women in the red jackets (NFRW women wore red jackets during their visit) posed on the steps of the Cannon House Office Building for a picture for the NFRW magazine.

Sens. Jim DeMint and Lindsey Graham were in committee meetings in the Hart Senate Office Building, but they took breaks to make brief remarks and have photos taken.

Afterward, members of Sen. Graham's staff escorted the South Carolina women from the Hart Building through the Russell Senate Office Building through special corridors where they finally boarded underground trams to the Capitol.

Lunch in the Congressional Dining Room was delayed.

President Bush was on the Hill that day, and the Secret Service shut down several hallways.

Rep. Bob Inglis hosted the lunch for the Greenville and Spartanburg County attendees. Afterward, he escorted the group to the House chamber, where the representatives were voting on the budget. The next bill to recess was met with shouts of "work, work" by the Republicans. The Democrats won, and they recessed. Rep. Gresham Barrett stopped by to greet the visitors.

A tour of the Rotunda and Senate chamber was not possible. The President was still on the Hill, where he presented medals of honor to the Tuskegee airmen, a World War II unit with the first black airmen.

The group was led outside for photos on the Capitol porch. Another staff member guided the group to the gift shop. The women then limped back to the bus for the short ride to the hotel for much needed rest.

S.C. group visits German Embassy

Ellen Weaver of Sen. DeMint's office arranged for the S.C. women to visit the German Embassy in the northwest area beyond the Georgetown section. Andreas Kruger, the German political director, talked to the group. He expressed his surprise at how America was so difficult to describe because it is so diverse and vast. His travels revealed that even in states, like New York, there are major differences between city and rural areas. He had visited the South Carolina coast and was impressed with Southern hospitality.

Ann Romney keynote speaker at fashion show

Ann Romney, wife of Presidential candidate Mitt Romney, spoke of the "bag of rocks" each one carries. She talked of her personal battle with multiple sclerosis.

Michael Steele, GOPAC chairman, was the master of ceremonies for the event. U.S. Marines escorted the models for the show.

A silent auction and a live auction took place. A bronze bust of Ronald Reagan, which weighs more than 50 pounds, miraculously fit into the trunk for the trip to Greenville. It now resides with Betty Poe.

Romney. All the candidates talked with delegates before the convention opened, and their supporters manned tables to hand out campaign literature. Each Presidential candidate gave a 10-minute presentation to the delegates on why they should be elected President.

After the Presidential candidates had departed, the delegates voted in a straw poll to determine their preference for President. The results were:

- Mitt Romney 132 (31 percent)
- Mike Huckabee 111 (26 percent)
- Duncan Hunter 87 (21 percent)
- Rudy Giuliani 35 (8 percent)
- Sam Brownback 19 (4.5 percent)
- John McCain 17 (4 percent) (Sen. McCain was not present)

- John Cox 10 (2 percent)
- Others 10 (2 percent)
